

So, things are opening up here in my corner of San Diego; there was church in the park, with plans to open the sanctuary in two scant weeks. So long as you stayed in place in your chair or blanket and stayed with your pod (aka family) you could keep your mask off. So, I got to see, off in the distance, all the families and individuals who make up our fellowship. Most faces I had seen only in Zoom, and some not at all, but there they were, familiar as always, like it had been just yesterday that I had seen Elise and Kathryn; Mona Jean; Bernard and Roberta; they looked the same; sat the same; were the same. COVID didn't erase character and heart and commitment.

There was cautious singing; though most of us mouthed the words, scared to breathe out and possibly harm the back of someone's head 6 feet away with our droplets. We were scared--scared for ourselves, but also scared for the people we love. We were scared to commune and connect, yes, but not so scared not to come. No hugs or even elbow bumps; loving eyes above masks were the most we could do, and we made the best of it.

We took cautious and informed risks. We (inwardly) exhaled as we saw each new family and person pull up in minivans and sedans and SUVs and even a couple motorcycles. We are still here. We are still here. Our songs are the same. Our concerns, different, but ya, the same. Aches and pains; and family strife; and mothers in Montana, and kids graduating, and fingers crossed for interviews and medical test results.

The last 18 months have scared and scarred us. But we have not been deterred. The small risk we take as we let our masks down (only for a moment!) so someone could see our smiles; choosing to inoculate because that means we will be able to be in sanctuary together (in however modified a form) in two weeks. We are changed people, with our masks, some of which show our personalities and interests--paisley! SD Padres! SDSU! Grinder! (this one sounds X rated, but I promise it's really not--it's an iconic sandwich shop in Lemon Grove).

Revealing and disclosing and risking, even as we mask and protect. So, it is here with us here at Lace on Race. It has been a hard few months for us too; and not because (or only because) of COVID.



Our virus/crisis was emotional/ethical/metaphorical, but, like COVID, it has had lasting effects. As our community emerges from the worst of it, masks on! (see the video) but still vulnerable; protective (of each other as much as for ourselves) but choosing to risk. Confronting and containing damage, mourning the loss of some; rejoicing in the addition of many more, we have shown our new people, and have reinforced for each other, who we were before our crisis of February, who we are in the here and now as we smile and reach out over our masks, and who we will be when we can sing with full throat and hug with abandon.

For those of you with blankets spread out in our virtual orchard, intimate and vulnerable and courageous and resilient and reliable--and relentless--we take this morning to rest in the shade of the trees we have nurtured; some for three years, some for three months or weeks or days or even hours--and then we lace up our shoes (here in SoCal we slide on our flip flops).

And then we take the risk of continuing to walk shoulder to shoulder and eye to eye toward our North Star. We keep each other safe-ish, and we never waver, and we share our blankets and orangeade.

Let's open up.
